## **INTRODUCTION AND METHODOLOGY**

*Inside Higher Ed* has partnered with Hanover Research to conduct its 12th annual Survey of College and University Presidents. The survey was administered in January and February 2022. A total of 2,992 presidents of public, private nonprofit and for-profit colleges were invited to participate; Hanover collected 375 fully or partially completed surveys, yielding a 12.5 percent response rate.

The survey is an attempted census of all presidents using the most comprehensive sample information available to target all eligible U.S. colleges and universities from the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System database. The margin of error for this survey is 4.73 percent given a total n-count of 375.

## **KEY FINDINGS**

- Most presidents are confident that their institution will be financially stable over the next 5 to 10 years. Slightly more agree that their institution will be financially stable over the next five years (81 percent) than in the next 10 years (77 percent).
- Fifty-four percent of presidents agree that their institution is in better financial shape now than it was in 2019, and even more (62 percent) agree that it is in better shape now than a year ago. Significantly more presidents at private nonprofit institutions (61 percent) than at public ones (50 percent) agree their institution is in better financial shape now than it was in 2019.
- Most respondents indicate that senior administrators at their institution have not had serious discussions regarding merging with another college or university in the past year. Presidents at private nonprofit colleges were twice as likely as their public college peers (20 percent vs. 11 percent) to say they've had such discussions.
- Slightly more than half of respondents indicate that their institutions do not require students or employees to be vaccinated.
- Nearly two-thirds of respondents say that less than a quarter of their students had contracted the virus at the time of the survey. About a quarter of presidents estimate that by fall 2022, more than half of their student population will have contracted COVID-19.
- Presidents report that a slightly greater proportion of their undergraduate courses are being taught in online or hybrid formats this fall (36 percent) compared to before the pandemic (29 percent). Leaders at public colleges report an average proportion of online and hybrid courses this fall (41 percent) that is twice as high as at their private nonprofit peers (17 percent).
- Most presidents report that fewer than a quarter of their non-faculty employees are working remotely this spring, and about three-quarters say the proportion of remote workers has decreased (50 percent significantly) since the 2020-21 academic year.
- About half of presidents report that their institution has altered its employment policies to give employees more flexibility after the pandemic ends. Significantly more respondents from private nonprofit institutions (25 percent) than public ones (15 percent) report that they are unlikely to alter their employment policies to give employees more flexibility.
- Most presidents (79 percent) agree that fewer prospective students and parents are willing to pay the same price for virtual as for in-person learning. Private college presidents overwhelmingly agree (87 percent) with this statement, while a third of community college leaders agree.


## **KEY FINDINGS (CONT.)**

- Between half and two-thirds of presidents report that their institution has the capacity to meet the mental health needs of any of its stakeholders. The highest percentage agree that their institution has the capacity to meet the needs of undergraduate (66 percent) and graduate (61 percent) students.
- Most presidents indicate that their institutions implemented beneficial changes during the pandemic. Presidents agree that they will keep some of these changes even after the pandemic ends (91 percent agree, 52 percent strongly), and were able to implement some positive, long-lasting institutional changes during the pandemic (89 percent agree, 44 percent strongly).
- Presidents generally agree that the state of race relations on their own campus is either excellent (10 percent) or good (63 percent), while barely a quarter say race relations are good on college campuses nationally. Almost two-thirds rate campus race relations nationally as fair.
- A little less than two-thirds of presidents report that the Biden administration's policies have had a positive effect on their institution. Significantly more respondents from public (69 percent) than private nonprofit (51 percent) institutions find that the Biden administration's policies have had positive effects on their institution.
- Most respondents (79 percent) agree that they are worried about Republican skepticism about higher education. Roughly the same proportion (78 percent) agree that the perception of colleges as places that are intolerant of conservative views is having a major negative impact on attitudes about higher education.


#### THE FINANCIAL PICTURE CONFIDENCE IN INSTITUTION'S FINANCIAL SITUATION

Most presidents are confident that their institution will be financially stable over the next five to 10 years. Slightly more agree that their institution will be financially stable over the next five years (81 percent) than in the next 10 years (77 percent).

I am confident my institution will be financially stable over the next ten years. (n=375)




Presidents in all sectors express confidence in the 10-year outlook for their institutions, although leaders of public master's, baccalaureate and community colleges are less likely than their peers to strongly agree that they are confident in their stability over a decade.

#### THE FINANCIAL PICTURE CONFIDENCE IN INSTITUTION'S FINANCIAL SITUATION (CONT.)

Fifty-four percent of presidents agree that their institution is in better financial shape now than it was in 2019, and even more (62 percent) agree that it is in better shape now than a year ago. Significantly more presidents at private nonprofit institutions (61 percent) than at public ones (50 percent) agree their institution is in better financial shape now than it was in 2019.

Twice as many presidents disagree (55 percent) as agree (26 percent) that their institution is in better financial shape now than they expect it to be a year from now, indicating confidence that the institutions will continue to thrive despite continuing enrollment declines and the trailing off of federal stimulus funds.

#### THE FINANCIAL PICTURE MERGING OR CONSOLIDATING PROGRAMS

Most respondents indicate that senior administrators at their institution have not had serious discussions regarding merging with another college or university in the past year. Presidents at private nonprofit colleges are twice as likely as their public college peers (20 percent vs. 11 percent) to say they've had such discussions.

A quarter of respondents report that senior administrators at their institution have had serious internal discussions in the last year about consolidating some programs or operations with another institution.

#### THE FINANCIAL PICTURE LIKELIHOOD OF MERGING OR ACQUIRING

The vast majority of presidents say they are unlikely to acquire or be acquired by another institution in the next five years.


But about 4 in 10 leaders of private nonprofit doctoral and master's universities say they are either somewhat (34 percent) or very likely (6 percent) to acquire another college within five years.



# How likely is your institution to merge into or be acquired by another college or university in the next five years? (n=327)




How likely is your institution to acquire another college or university in the next five years? (n=329)




#### THE FINANCIAL PICTURE SHARING FUNCTIONS AND COMBINING PROGRAMS


A little less than half of respondents report that they are somewhat or very likely to share administrative functions or combine academic programs with another institution in the next five years. More presidents from private nonprofit (53 percent) than from public institutions (40 percent) say they are somewhat or very likely to share administrative functions with another institution in the next five years.

How likely is your institution to combine academic programs with those of another college or university in the next five years? (n=324)




#### THE FINANCIAL PICTURE SHOULD OR SHOULD NOT COMBINE INSTITUTIONS

Presidents overwhelmingly say their institution should not merge with another college or university in the next five years. But slightly more than half think that their institutions

Significantly more respondents from private nonprofit institutions (61 percent) than from public ones (49 percent) believe that their institution should combine academic programs or share administrative functions with another college or university in the next five years.


#### Do you think your institution should or should not...



#### **COVID-19'S IMPACT VACCINATION POLICIES**


Slightly more than half of respondents indicate that their institutions do not require students or employees to be vaccinated. More respondents from private nonprofit colleges (44 percent) than public institutions (29 percent) report that all employees and students are required to be vaccinated. And more respondents from public institutions (58 percent) report that neither students nor employees are currently required to be vaccinated than is true for their private nonprofit peers (46 percent).

About half of institutions surveyed who require vaccinations also require a booster shot.

Does your institution's vaccine mandate also require a booster shot? (n=168)





#### COVID-19'S IMPACT "NEW NORMAL" DURING THE PANDEMIC

About two-thirds of respondents agree that their institutions have settled into a "new normal" given the ongoing nature of the pandemic. Presidents at public and private nonprofit institutions answered this question similarly..


#### To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statement?

#### COVID-19'S IMPACT EFFECTIVENESS OF PANDEMIC POLICIES

More than 90 percent of presidents say their institution's pandemic policies have been somewhat or very effective. More respondents from private nonprofit colleges than from public ones report that their policies were somewhat or very effective when it came to allowing students and staff to safely gather indoors (98 percent vs. 89 percent).




...prevent your institution from having to make changes to pandemic-related policies mid-semester. (n=356)


#### COVID-19'S IMPACT PERCENTAGE OF STUDENTS CONTRACTING COVID-19

Nearly two-thirds of respondents say that less than a quarter of their students had contracted the virus at the time of the survey. Community college leaders (71 percent) are most likely to report COVID infection at that level, while about one in seven presidents of public doctoral universities (13 percent) estimate that between half and three-quarters of their students have contracted COVID. About a quarter of presidents estimate that by fall 2022, more than half of their student population will have contracted COVID-19.

#### At this point, what percentage of your students do you estimate have contracted COVID-19? (n=358)




# By the fall semester, what percentage of your students do you think will have contracted COVID-19? (n=358)



#### REMOTE LEARNING AND VIRTUAL WORK FORMATS OF UNDERGRADUATE COURSES

Presidents report that a slightly greater proportion of their undergraduate courses are being taught in online or hybrid formats this fall (36 percent) compared to before the pandemic (29 percent), but expect those levels to return to pre-pandemic totals by next year (32 percent).

Leaders at public colleges report an average proportion of online and hybrid courses this fall (41 percent) that is twice as high as at their private nonprofit peers (17 percent). Community college leaders report the highest proportion of all, at 49 percent.




Percentage Estimates of Undergraduate Courses in Each Format

#### REMOTE LEARNING AND VIRTUAL WORK QUALITY OF COURSES BASED ON FORMAT

All presidents rate the overall/average quality of their institution's in-person courses this spring as good or excellent. Most, but fewer, say the same for their hybrid classes (27 percent excellent, 55 percent good) and fully online courses (19 percent excellent, 59 percent good).


Presidents of private baccalaureate colleges are likeliest to rate their fully online courses lower; a third say they are fair or worse.



#### REMOTE LEARNING AND VIRTUAL WORK REMOTE WORK FOR NON-FACULTY STAFF


Most presidents report that fewer than a quarter of their non-faculty employees are working remotely this spring, and about three-quarters say the proportion of remote workers has decreased (50 percent significantly) since the 2020-21 academic year.

Public doctoral universities report the highest proportion of non-faculty staff who are working remotely this spring, with 29 percent reporting it as more than 25 percent. Nearly a third of community college presidents (32 percent) say none of their staff is working remotely.

How has the proportion of non-faculty staff working remotely changed in the 2021-22 academic year as compared to 2020-21? (n=347)





#### REMOTE LEARNING AND VIRTUAL WORK CAMPUS FOOTPRINT AND REMOTE WORK POLICIES

About half of presidents report that their institution has altered its employment policies to give employees more flexibility after the pandemic ends. Significantly more respondents from private nonprofit institutions (25 percent) than public ones (15 percent) report that they are unlikely to alter their employment policies to give employees more flexibility.

Half of presidents also report that they think it is not at all likely that their institution will shrink its physical campus footprint in the next five years. Significantly more respondents from private nonprofit colleges (57 percent) report that this is the case than from public ones (45 percent), with about a quarter of community college leaders saying it is likely that their institutions physically shrink.

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


#### MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS OF COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH

Almost all presidents report that they are somewhat or very aware of the state of mental health as it relates to staff, undergraduate students and faculty. Most also report that they are at least somewhat aware of the general state of mental health of graduate students (89 percent), with less than half saying the same for parents (48 percent) or alumni (41 percent).



#### MENTAL HEALTH INSTITUTIONAL CAPACITY TO MEET MENTAL HEALTH NEEDS

Between half and two-thirds of presidents report that their institution has the capacity to meet the mental health needs of any of its stakeholders. The highest percentage agree that their institution has the capacity to meet the needs of undergraduate (66 percent) and graduate (61 percent) students. No significant differences exist between public and private nonprofit colleges in this regard.




#### MENTAL HEALTH INSTITUTIONAL CAPACITY TO MEET MENTAL HEALTH NEEDS (CONT.)

Among respondents who report that their institution has sufficient capacity to meet the needs of any of their stakeholders, most report that this is the case because their institution has: increased its budget for mental health-related services (71 percent), invested in telehealth services (70 percent), and increased availability of appointments with mental health services (70 percent).

About three-fourths of respondents indicate that their institution plans to increase its capacity to meet the mental health needs of its students, staff and/or faculty.

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

#### MENTAL HEALTH CAUSES OF INCREASED DEMAND FOR MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

Asked to rate which factors most contribute to the increased need for student mental health services, presidents cite declining student resilience because of the prolonged nature of the pandemic (76 percent) and the difficulty around balancing multiple aspects of personal and academic life (62 percent).

Significantly more presidents from public institutions (69 percent) than private nonprofit colleges (48 percent) rate the need to balance personal economic and familial duties with academic work as very or extremely influential to the increase in demand for mental health services.

# To what extent do you believe each of the following has influenced the increased demand for student mental health services?






#### INSTITUTIONAL CHANGE OPPORTUNITY FOR CHANGE DURING THE PANDEMIC

About three-fourths of presidents agree that the pandemic created an opportunity for their college or university to make other institutional changes they wanted to make anyway. Presidents of four-year private baccalaureate colleges were least likely to say they have this opportunity.

#### INSTITUTIONAL CHANGE CHANGES MADE DURING THE PANDEMIC

Most presidents indicate that their institutions implemented beneficial changes during the pandemic they will keep even after it ends. Presidents agree that their institution was pushed to think out of the box during the pandemic in a way that will benefit the institution in the long run (94 percent agree, 58 percent strongly); will keep some of these changes even after the pandemic ends (91 percent agree, 52 percent strongly); and was able to implement some positive, long-lasting institutional changes during the pandemic (89 percent agree, 44 percent strongly).


Community college presidents were much likelier than other leaders to strongly agree with those statements, with at least 60 percent strongly agreeing with all three statements.




...was pushed to think out of the box during the pandemic in a way that will benefit the institution in the long run (n=340)





#### **INSTITUTIONAL CHANGE CHANGES INSTITUTIONS PLAN TO KEEP**

Presidents say that their institutions will largely keep changes related to online learning, remote work and mental health services. The largest proportions of presidents indicate that their institution plans to keep changes related to increased online learning options (83 percent), additional flexibility for staff to work remotely (76 percent), and additional investments in mental health services (75 percent). About half say they'll create more alternative credentials, less than half say they plan to extend test-optional or test-blind policies, and about a guarter expect to pursue more external partnerships to deliver core programs and services.

#### INSTITUTIONAL CHANGE CHANGE MANAGEMENT

More than two-thirds of chief executives say their institution needs to make fundamental changes in its business model, programming or other operations.

Presidents are likelier to believe their institution has the right mindset to respond to needed changes (78 percent agree, 29 percent strongly) than to believe it has the right tools and processes (73 percent, 20 percent strongly).

Leaders are divided (45 percent agree, 33 percent disagree) on whether their institution needs a shared governance process that allows for speedier decision making.

A slim majority of presidents agree that faculty members understand the challenges confronting their institution.





#### ISSUES OF RACE STATE OF RACE RELATIONS

Presidents generally agree that the state of race relations on their own campus is either excellent (10 percent) or good (63 percent), while barely a quarter say race relations are good on college campuses nationally. Almost two-thirds rate campus race relations nationally as fair.





#### ISSUES OF RACE COVID'S IMPACT ON THE HIGHER EDUCATION LANDSCAPE

Most presidents (79 percent) agree that fewer prospective students and parents are willing to pay the same price for virtual as for in-person learning. Private college presidents overwhelmingly agree (87 percent) with this statement, while a third of community college leaders agree.

Half of surveyed presidents agree that the pandemic will cause a shift in enrollment trends toward virtual instruction, with chief executives of private nonprofit institutions less likely to agree (36 percent) than their public college counterparts (58 percent).

Presidents are more likely to disagree (40 percent) than to agree (34 percent) that the pandemic will cause a shift from costlier to less expensive colleges. Presidents of private doctoral and master's universities are far likelier to disagree (58 percent) than to agree (23 percent).


# To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements about how COVID-19 has changed the higher education landscape?




Fewer prospective students and parents are interested in paying the same price for virtual learning as for in-person learning. (n=346)

COVID-19 will cause a shift from more expensive colleges to more affordable ones, such as community colleges. (n=346)




#### ISSUES OF RACE AFFIRMATIVE ACTION AND THE SUPREME COURT

A majority of presidents disagree that their institutions would either face unrest or have to adjust its policies should the U.S. Supreme Court curtail the use of affirmative action in admissions.

About two-thirds of presidents disagree that race relations at their institution would worsen (63 percent) or that there would be increased racial unrest and protests (67 percent).

A little more than three-fourths of respondents disagree that their institution would have to significantly adjust their admissions policies (77 percent) or financial aid policies (77 percent) should the Supreme Court curtail the use of affirmative action in admissions.

If the Supreme Court does curtail the use of affirmative action in admissions...


#### POLITICS, POLICY AND IMAGE THE BIDEN ADMINISTRATION'S EARLY ACTIONS

Less than two-thirds of presidents report that the Biden administration's policies have positively affected their institution. More respondents from public (69 percent) than private nonprofit (51 percent) institutions say the administration's policies have had positive effects.

Less than half of respondents report that they are satisfied with what the Biden administration accomplished in higher education in its first year. Only 43 percent indicate that they are at least somewhat satisfied, while 28 percent report being somewhat or completely dissatisfied. Significantly more respondents from public (49 percent) than private nonprofit (35 percent) institutions are at least somewhat satisfied.

About half of presidents are not at all confident that the Biden administration will be able to deliver on its initial higher education promises.





#### POLITICS, POLICY AND IMAGE PERCEPTIONS OF LOCAL POLITICAL CLIMATE

Presidents are divided on how their state's political climate is affecting their institutions. About a third (34 percent) report that the political environment in their state has a more negative effect than in 2020, 36 percent indicate that there is not a change in its effect, and 30 percent indicate that their political climate has a more positive effect on their institution than in 2020. Significantly more respondents from public (36 percent) than private institutions (22 percent) report that their state's political environment has been positive.

#### POLITICS, POLICY AND IMAGE IMAGE OF HIGHER ED

Most respondents (79 percent) agree that they are worried about Republican skepticism about higher education. Roughly the same proportion (78 percent) agree that the perception of colleges as places that are intolerant of conservative views is having a major negative impact on attitudes about higher education.

About two-thirds (64 percent) agree that their classrooms are as welcoming to conversative students as they are to liberal ones, and 40 percent disagree that the perception of colleges as intolerant of conservative views is accurate.

Significantly more respondents from private nonprofit colleges (57 percent) than public institutions (37 percent) agree that the perception of colleges as places that are intolerant of conservative views is accurate.


I am worried about Republicans' increasing skepticism about higher education. (n=325)


